• Behavior or actions taken by the victim that may or not contribute to the offender's <u>criminal act</u> against them.

Victims Risk Factors

<u>Low Risk</u>: The victim does not expose themselves to criminal environment is guarded and concerned with security.

<u>Medium Risk</u>: The victim unintentionally disregards their vulnerability and security guardianship to criminal acts against them at low risk environments.

<u>High Risk</u>: The victim is involved in activity that is non-criminal that exposes them with or without disregard of the criminal environment.

<u>Extreme Risk</u>: The victim is involved in criminal activity or self harm that excels their victim potential.



- Anyone and Everyone can be a Low Risk victim.
- Do bad things happen to good people?
- What is an innocent victim?

Medium Risk Victims

- Substance Abuse in a Non Criminal Environment
- Bank worker or Business worker walking with money bag visible to public
- Delivery of high valuables without security concerns
- Living alone without any concern for security or guardianship
- Associating with known active criminals
- Acting in self defense of others

High Risk Victims

- Victim exposing with disregard; of their valuables in criminal environment.
- Leaving their vehicles open or unlocked
- Bringing strangers to your home on first day of meeting without vetting them.
- Police officers or Public Safety not prepared or training for their tour of duty.
- Gentlemen's Club Dancer; walking alone to their car; patrons
- Domestic Violence relationship
- Disregard of the safety of family members (Human Trafficking)

Extreme, High Risk Victims

- Involved in the commission of a crime;
- Involved in a criminal enterprise in a criminal environment
- Overdoses, Substance Abuse
- DUI; vehicle
- Prostitution (Human Trafficking)

Crime Scene Behavior of Offender

• For the purposes of understanding the needs of the offender, level of intent, mental state, knowledge of wrongdoing, and relationship to the victim in preparation for criminal investigation in establishing motive, modus operandi, locating the offender, and preparation for the interview or interrogation.

Victims timeline

- Arrival at the scene
